The independent sector has produced
many of the most distinctive films to have
appeared in the US in recent decades.
From 'Sex, Lies and Videotape' in the

1980s to 'The Blair Witch Project' and New
Queer Cinema in the 1990s and the ultra-
low budget digital video features of the
2000s, indie films have thrived, creating a
body of work that stands out from the
dominant Hollywood mainstream. But
what exactly is 'independent' cinema?
This, the first book to examine the
question in detail, argues that
independence can be defined partly in
industry terms but also according to
formal and aesthetic strategies and by
distinctive attitudes towards social and
political issues, suggesting that

independence is a dynamic rather than a fixed quality. Chapters focus on distribution and relationships with Hollywood studios; narrative ('Clerks' and 'Slacker' to 'Pulp Fiction', 'Magnolia' and 'Memento') and other formal dimensions (from 'Blair Witch's' 'authenticity' to expressive and stylized camerawork and editing in work from Harmony Korine to the Coen brothers); approaches to genre and alternative socio-political visions. *Footnotes from the World's Greatest Bookstores* Simon and Schuster

In this engaging, candid memoir, Chopra describes how she learned to navigate the deeply embedded sexism of the film industry, helping to pave the way for a generation of women filmmakers who would come after her. She shares stories of her bruising encounters with Harvey Weinstein and Sydney Pollack,

her experience directing Diane Keaton, Treat Williams, and a host of other actors, as well as her deep friendships with Gene Wilder, Arthur Miller, and Laura Dern. Along with the successes and failures of her career, she provides an intimate view of a woman's struggle to balance the responsibilities and rewards of motherhood and marriage with a steadfast commitment to personal creative achievement. Among Russell's most controversial points is his argument that the enemies of the renegade freedoms we now hold dear are the very heroes of our history books - he not only takes on traditional idols like John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, Andrew Carnegie, John Rockefeller, Thomas Edison, Franklin Roosevelt, and John F. Kennedy, but he also shows that some of the most famous and revered abolitionists, progressive activists, and leaders of the feminist, civil rights, and gay rights movements worked to suppress the vibrant energies of working-class women, immigrants, African Americans, and the drag queens who founded Gay Liberation.
