something so happily

foxes. She is  
unashamedly, irrefutably,  
irrepressibly wild. That is,  
until she is snared by  
some very strange  
animals that look oddly  
like her, but they don't  
talk right, eat right, or  
play correctly. She's  
puzzled by their behavior  
and their insistence on  
living in these strange  
concrete structures:  
there's no green here, no  
animals, no trees, no  
rivers. Now she lives in  
the comfort of civilization.

But will civilization get  
comfortable with her? In  
her debut picture book,  
Hughes brings an  
uncanny humor to her  
painterly illustrations. Her  
work is awash with color,  
atmosphere, and a  
stunning visual splendor  
that will enchant children  
while indulging their  
wilder tendencies. Wild is  
a twenty-first-century  
answer to Maurice  
Sendak's children's  
classic--it has the same  
inventiveness,  
groundbreaking art, and  
unmissable quirkiness.
