Tabernacle comes from the Latin *tabernaculum* (meaning tent) because the Ark of the Covenant, carrying God's sacred Law, was carried by the Israelites in the desert in a tent. In the Christian Church, this sacred law is now fulfilled in Jesus Christ, who is present in the Eucharist which is often reserved inside the tabernacle. Stained glass windows were first popularized in the twelfth century to help those who could not read learn the stories they depict. Inside the monstrance, the Eucharist is held in a glass container called a *luna* or *lunette*. At Mass or at other times in the church, we sit to learn, we stand to show something exceptional is

happening (such as during the reading of the Gospels and specific prayers), and we kneel to show reverence to God.
